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

Every New Priest Can Use a New Suit.

Our group of 19 travelers arrived in Moshi Tanzania on July 4th 2017. We celebrated the 4th of July with a group of students from a university in Georgia who were there for Swahili immersion training. I'd like to try that too!

On July 5th, Lenore Fines and T.O Bennett met their "sons" who were to be ordained the next day. Fr. Gabriel Ngarau and Fr. Adelard Imani received the very special gift of new, tailor-made suits. As you can see from the pictures, the tailor shop is not quite the same as in the USA.

We met the tailor on the street in front of his treadle sewing machine. Each of the (soon-to-be) new priests were measured and chose their preferred fabric from small swatches that the tailor had there. The new suits only take a few days to be sewed and ready for pickup.

This is a great gift for under \$50 USD - if anyone needs an idea of a gift for their favorite Moshi priest or seminarian. We can take them to the tailor shop in July 2018 when we visit Moshi for the priesthood ordination of the 2018 class!

Do we have names?

Wachagga had it before Christianity. Wachagga had their way of naming. They call it "iiningarina" (giving a name). The names are connected to the names of former members of the clan, from father's clan and mother's clan alternately. The first born takes a name from the father's clan and the second takes from the mother's clan. They believed that some misfortunes will happen if the tradition is not maintained. They believed that the spirit of elders exists in their grandchildren and great grandchildren. This approach when Christianized fits baptizing by giving the names of the saints.




Emmanuel Tumaini

I became Fr. Gabriel Ngarau's sponsor in 2012 and always looked forward to returning to Tanzania for his ordination. I first visited Tanzania in 2011 with my husband and Fr. Peter Siamoo, but never met Fr. Gabriel. We became acquainted through emails and finally met face-to-face on July 5th, when the group of deacons was exiting the chapel at Mwenge Retreat Center.

Fr. Gabriel welcomed me with open arms and a big smile! T.O. Bennett arranged for us to visit a tailor in Moshi so that we could have a new suit made for him. It was a delightful experience to pick out fabric and then watch the street-side tailor deftly take Fr. Gabriel's measurements! Attending the ordination at the cathedral on July 6th was one of the most joyful and meaningful experiences of my life. I was so grateful to be there and to see Fr. Gabriel finally be ordained. My brother, Tony Fines, was the designated photographer and did a wonderful job documenting the event through beautiful photos. The music, singing, pageantry, and ritual were truly amazing and very moving. After the ordination and the reception, Fr. Gabriel invited my brother, Tony, sister-in-law, Susan, and me to go to Uomboni Parish, his home parish. We readily accepted the invitation and were grateful to Fr. Matthew for driving us. After an hour and a half, we approached Uombini, which is located in the foothills of Mt. Kilimanjaro at about 5,000-6,000 feet elevation. Fr. Gabriel's arrival was met by a large and enthusiastic crowd -- colorfully dressed, singing, and waving palm branches. The star had arrived! We were graciously greeted by Fr. Juvenalis, the parish priest, and then gathered in the church for a warm welcome and an outdoor reception. The parishioners were so happy and excited to have Fr. Gabriel return home! The following day, Fr. Gabriel invited us to visit his family home, which is located in the Uomboni area. We readily accepted the invitation and were grateful to Fr. Mtui for driving us in his Toyota RAV4 up the slopes of Mt. Kilimanjaro over unpaved, rocky, and rural roads. Upon arrival, we were happily greeted by a group of women dressed in colorful clothing and singing as they led us down the trail through lush vegetation to the family homestead. We were warmly welcomed by about 100 family members and friends and were told that we were the first white people to have visited! We met Fr. Gabriel's parents, twin brother, and his two younger sisters. After exchanging greetings and taking photos, we were invited into a tiny, wooden, oneroom house, where we were served a delicious dinner, all prepared by Fr. Gabriel's mother. Almost everything we ate came from their family farm. We learned that they had neither electricity nor running water. This home visit was the highlight of our trip. Two days later, we returned to Uomboni Parish for Fr. Gabriel's Thanksgiving Mass, which again was an amazing experience. The church was packed with people! After the mass, we attended a very lively outdoor reception, complete with live music, dancing, and a roasted goat! We felt truly honored to be part of the celebration!

As I look back, I feel that sponsoring Fr. Gabriel and attending his ordination was one of the most rewarding and meaningful things that I have ever done. I will always treasure the experiences that we had in Tanzania in July 2017.
