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MY VOCATION STORY

As far as I can remember, there are two notable stories about my priestly vocation. My memory evokes environmental circumstances which made my discernment to priestly vocation. These are as follows:

First, By the fact of being just nearby to my home parish it was obvious that many times I had an encounter with both priests and sisters, many times they were coming at our home for some reasons, in my young age I could see how my parents received them fervently, served them then finally they said a prayer for us, blessed us and got away. I could hear them pray Mass, singing, wearing cassocks, driving parish car which was only one in the entire parish covering about eight villages. So all these circumstance moved me to aspire becoming a priest.

Another clear event I can remember is when I was in standard two by the year 2004, I was passing just beside the Sacristy door, and soon the nun who used to work in parish Sacristy opened the Sacristy door and immediately saw me, and she called me, in fact I was so little shabby with uncombed hair, bare footed, wearing torn worn out trouser and I thought she was going to punish me because of being so rough. Instead she gave me a bucket and asked me to get water for her. I took the bucket and went my way to fetch water in the furrow flowing outside parish fence.

When I came back, I knocked the door and a nun opened and became so astonished seeing the bucket full of water, why? Because, she could not expect that as little as I was, I could be able to bring to her a bucket full of water; in her joy she uttered to me in Swahili, "Utakuwa Padre mzuri." That means you shall be a good priest. Since then, those words grew with me wherever I go, whatever I do, whenever I think. Such words have never departed from my mind and it is in this spirit, I wish she could be alive so that in that particular hour of my ordination I could tell her a tale of how strong her words have been to me for all these years.

Six years later, I went to minor seminary from 2010 to 2016, then to major seminary in 2017. Now, I am in third year of Theology at St. Charles Lwanga Senior Seminary in Dar es Salaam



In our seminary "Kipalapala" the issue of doing activities especially Agricultural ones, is a normal thing. This helps the seminary to have enough food in all seasons of the year. Working gives four benefits:

- Helps easy access of basic needs.
- Helps keeping the body in a good health.
- Helps limiting the chances of sin because, there will be no time to allow the devil to tempt the life of a person.
- The one who works effectively is loved by people.

Laziness leads a person to get into many troubles. According to Holy Writ, the book of **Ecclesiasticus** (22:1-2) speaks very well, warning people from the issue of Laziness, he writes with a very special emphasis so that people should stop Laziness and work hard in order to live well. If a person is lazy people will run away from him or her because he or she eats theirs and exploits them, but also diseases such as heartache, swelling of legs etc. will attack him/her.
