

gospel, to have a share in its blessing" (1Cor. 9:22-23). This vocation is of great value and demands a loving, caring, happy and responsible person.



OUR VICARIATE

Our Vicariate is called Rombo. It is located in Tanzania, Kilimanjaro region under the slopes of Mount Kilimanjaro which is the greatest mountain in Africa. Rombo is bordered to the north and east by Kenya. It contains a large portion of Kilimanjaro National Park. It has a great number of people about 360,963, and most of them are Catholics. So it is common that the number of Bishops, Priests, nuns and religious from this area is very high in comparison to others.

Most people in Rombo Vicariate are Chagga in tribe and their traditional language is Chagga. For example the word 'Father' they call 'tata', 'Mother'-'mayo', Grandmother'-'shokuyo', 'Grand-father'-'sahayo', 'Morning'-'kang'ama' etc. They have different customs and traditions for the aim of strengthening unity, respect and cooperation among the members. Chagga people have their traditional drink called "MBEGE". This is **the proud of Chaggas**. "MBEGE" is an alcoholic drink which is prepared by using bananas and millets. Chaggas are very kind especially for the guests.

Traditionally Chagga prefer their traditional foods. The main being 'UMBERE' this is the mixture of cooked banana and beans grinded together and produce a stiff liquid (porridge-form).

Their great economic activity is agriculture. They usually practice small scale farming for their food only. This is a mixed farming system. Rather they plant few cash

crops. Food crops planted here are bananas, maize (corn), beans, groundnuts, vegetables and cassava. On the hand, commercial crop is only coffee and that is due to the nature of the soil of our land.
